

Something bad was coming. I could feel it in the air. I couldn't hear the sound of the people or boats that usually wandered up and down the river. My family had packed a few

things and said they would be back in a couple of days. They often went fishing or hunting. I used to go, but now that I have grown old, I am happiest just lying around the house. My hearing is not as good as it was, and my joints are swollen and pained with arthritis. My favorite place is the front porch. It faces the beautiful river. Most of the people wave as they go by.

The next morning the wind began to blow incredibly hard. The river that usually wound its way lazily between its banks was dark and gloomy. Heavy rain was beginning to wash away the banks of the river, sweeping the sand along as the current rushed to its destination The sudden crash of thunder scared me. It continued so violently that I shook with uncontrollable fear. I tried hiding in the bedroom closet. I always felt safe there. The thunder increased, and I huddled deeper into the depths of the closet. I was born in this house. I thought I knew every sight and sound, but this night it was different.

I don't know how long I hid in the closet. The thunder and rain subsided, and I napped a bit from time to time. The sound of splashing water alerted me to the fact that my feet were getting wet. I realized that the water was rapidly rising and flooding the first floor. I tried to step out onto the porch, but the water was coming under the door too fast. I didn't know where to go or what to do. There had never been water in the house before. I thought about the loft. That would surely be drier. I made my way cautiously up the dark stairway. Debris floated along my pathway. At last I made my way to the top of the stairs and hid under the bed. The windows were blown out and most of the roof was gone, but there was a section just over the bed that was still relatively dry. I lay under the bed and slept fitfully for a while. I woke abruptly when the water rose to the second floor. I got up on the bed. It was wet but at least it wasn't under water, yet. I realized I wouldn't be safe here much longer. Did I dare leave? What if the family came back looking for me? I never was very fond of the water. I have to admit I don't like getting wet. Maybe I should stay here. I always take



care of the house. I don't want the family to come back and find me gone. I knew they would worry. If I just stayed on the bed maybe I wouldn't get too wet.

Eventually, the water became too deep. I would have to leave and take my chances. It was only a matter of time before I would drown. I looked out of the window. Water and floating debris was all I could see. I would have to swim to safety. I had to take the chance. It was starting to get dark again. I raised myself up onto the windowsill and with only a slight hesitation I leaped into the cold murky water. The river had overflowed its banks. The strong current swept me along, sometimes bumping me into submerged debris. There were trees down everywhere. It was difficult to get my bearings. I knew I had to find a place to get out of the water. I tried to climb onto a piece of floating wood, but I was too weak. I was exhausted but somehow I managed to swim on. I had no idea how far the rushing water was taking me. I only knew I had to keep on until I found a way out of the dark and putrid water. Several times, I found myself beginning to sink under the water. I swallowed some of the foul liquid, gasped, and began flailing about until I gained some control again. I had to get out of this water.

I felt my feet touching something solid. My heart began to pound. I could feel the ground beneath me. I pulled myself out of the water and lay down on the bank. I was exhausted. Where were all the people? I crawled a little farther from the water's edge. I wasn't sure where I was. Nothing looked familiar, but I had the feeling I had been here before. At least it was better than being in the water. Anything was better than the water. I was hungry and so very thirsty. There was water everywhere, but it smelled funny, and I knew I shouldn't drink it. Maybe, if I could walk a little way I would find someone who would give me some food or water. I walked slowly now. Blood was flowing from my foot. I had cut myself on some glass when I jumped out of the window. I limped along the dark deserted streets. My head hurt, and one eye was almost closed. The rescuers huddled closer together, and I heard only hushed whispers as they looked at me. One of the men laid his hand on my shoulder and spoke. "Take it easy old timer. You're safe now," he said. "You must be very thirsty," one of my rescuers said. I was. She gave me a sip of water. "Not too much at a time," she said softly. "We are taking you to a place where they can take care of your foot and

the cut over your eye." So, I was cut over the eye. I knew my foot was painful and my head throbbed. I don't remember much about the ride. I drifted in and out of consciousness. Each time the female voice comforted me and told me I was safe. The van came to a stop. "Look who we found," she said to someone. "Oliver," shouted a familiar voice. Was it really little Maggie or was I dreaming? "We thought we lost you." Soft little arms encircled my neck and stroked my head. I could feel her warm salty tears on my face. "You are so brave. You found your way to us. We have been so worried. We will never leave you again." All I could do was wag my tail.

With hurricane season breathing down our necks and so much talk on preparedness, be sure to find a safe place for all members of your family.

A World Away

Last month two friends and I took a trip down to Orlando to a section of the city we had never seen before. It is located just a few blocks from the huge stadium where many diverse and affluent

Orlando businesses are located. Yet it is a world away from the comfortable life that we consider "normal." After parking in a small crowded lot, we walked through a gate, and it was like stepping into a 3rd world country. It was such a stark contrast to the world we are accustomed to in the "land of opportunity."

Christian Service Center is a place for homeless people to receive help for basic human needs. As we toured the facility,



there were at least 200 people there that day, each one with a story and a hurting heart. It was so sad to witness, yet I was thrilled to see the many volunteers and ministries that work long hours every day to help these hurting people. I noticed wide and varied demographics of needy people, from a young pregnant girl to many elderly people and lots of middle aged men and women. Sadly, homelessness is on the rise all over our country for many reasons (beyond the scope of this article).



I have been doing some volunteering in our area for the last eighteen months with

two ministries that help the homeless and needy of Leesburg and the surrounding area. I have met many homeless (unhoused) folks and taken the time to listen to some of their stories. Homeless are people from all walks of life, young and old,



people like us—in need. One of the ministries, Friends of the Homeless, does a weekly feeding route all around Leesburg and Fruitland Park. I tagged along with the volunteer last month and was overwhelmed to see the many places around our area that are full of encampments of people trying to survive day to day. We handed out food and basic supplies to help, and offered an encouraging word. It is truly overwhelming to see the way people are living just a few blocks away.



As I shared this experience with my exercise class at the clubhouse, they immediately wanted to help! So, we committed to make sandwiches and provide fruit, water, and cookies for the Friends of the Homeless ministry once a month. We welcome

donations from anyone who would like to contribute food items, cases of water, or cash to help us fulfill our monthly commitment.

There will be an orange sheet of paper on the

The July Book Club selection, Remarkably Bright Creatures by Shelby Van Pelt, was a delightful novel connecting three characters: a seventy-year-old widow named

Tova Sullivan, an unemployed thirty-year-old man named Cameron Cashmore, and a giant Pacific octopus living in the Sowell Bay Aquarium named Marcellus.

After Tova's husband dies, she decides to start working as the nighttime cleaning lady at the Sowell Aquarium. Every night she makes her rounds, greeting all the sea creatures living in glass tanks. She quickly becomes an expert in cleaning fingerprints and other prints off the glass and keeps the floors spotless using her own personal cleaners. Tova is also a mother to eighteen-year-old Erik who mysteriously vanished from a boat in the Puget Sound over thirty years ago.

Marcellus is a smart creature, capable of changing color to match his surroundings, using his tentacles to open boxes and more. Marcellus also knows his time in the aquarium is limited; the average life span is four years, 1460 days. It is now day 1299 of captivity in the Sowell Bay Aquarium. Marcellus and Tova's relationship begins when she discovers the octopus in the staff breakroom, trapped in electrical cords. She helps untangle the octopus and returns him to his tank. Once Marcellus can recover from his adventure, he reaches out for Tova, wrapping his tentacles around her arm, leaving suction marks on her skin. Tova does not withdraw from this kind gesture of thanks from this curious creature.

Cameron was raised by his Aunt Jeanne from the time he was nine years old. His mother was an addict, and he never knew his father. His adult life has been a series of jobs he can never keep, leading to failed relationships, no where to live, and his current situation, living on a friend's couch. On a visit to Aunt Jeanne, Cameron receives a box of his mother's belongings. In the box, Cameron discovers a class ring from Sowell Bay High School Class of 1989 and a photograph of his mother and a young man. With nothing else to do, Cameron begins investigating the photo and class ring. While searching the Sowell High School 1989 yearbook, he discovers the name of the man in the

picture, Simon Brinks. After a quick plane ride to Washington, Cameron's luggage is lost, leaving him with \$4 in his pocket and no clothes. With a loan from his Aunt, Cameron purchases a run-down, old camper to make the rest of the journey to Sowell Bay, Washington, to find the man he believes to be his father.

In the town of Sowell Bay is the Shop-Way owned and operated by Ethan. As the store cashier, there is nothing Ethan doesn't know about the people and the town of Sowell Bay. Tova is one of his favorite customers and he regularly flirts with her. Ethan becomes one of the links connecting Tova and Cameron. When Cameron arrives in town, needing a job, Ethan takes a chance on him in the Shop-Way. Ethan also helps find Cameron a second short term job, nighttime cleaner at the Sowell Bay Aquarium, filling in for their permanent employee, Tova, who has been injured.

Tova, Cameron, and Marcellus begin to develop a special bond while working together. Tova refuses to stay home while she recovers, so she comes to the Aquarium nightly to teach the replacement how to properly clean the floors and the glass tanks. Marcellus continues his nightly wandering and begins to tell the tale of treasures he has collected on his adventures including one of Tova's keys, an earring, a class ring. He even manages to take Cameron's driver's license. Listening to Tova and Cameron's conversations, the very intelligent creature discovers that Tova and Cameron are more than just friends. After weeks of calls to Simon Brinks and his employees, Cameron meets with him. Simon shares stories of his relationship with Daphne Cashmore, Cameron's mother. They were merely friends because she was in love with another boy who was killed when he fell out of a boat in the Puget Sound. Shortly after his death, her sister, Jeanne, took her now pregnant little sister to live with her in California.

This book was an easy read with some plot twists from a Giant Pacific Octopus. Marcellus uses his skills as detective to deduce what happened to Tova's son and works to help her discover the truth before it is too late for him and her. Tova has decided to move to the Charter Village retirement community in Bellingham. For Marcellus it is day 1352 in captivity. And the class ring? It was inscribed with the letters ELS for Ernest Lindgren Sullivan.
